Highlights of NIEPMD Activities during the year 2013-14

National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities under the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt.of India was established in 2005 at ECR, Muttukadu, Chennai, Tamil Nadu, to fulfill the objective of serving as a National Resource centre for empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities such as those with two or more disabilities in one person. The enumerated disabilities as per PWD (1995) Act are. Low vision, Blindness, Locomotor disability, Hearing Impairment, Mental Retardation, Mental Illness, Leprosy Cured persons, and as per National Trust (1999) Act, Cerebral Palsy and Autism. During the year 2013-14, NIEPMD achieved many milestones; some of the details are as follows,

- NIEPMD celebrated the World Autism Awareness Day on 2nd April 2013. To mark the
 occasion various cultural program had been performed by Diploma trainees of Autism
 and Persons with Autism.
- NIEPMD offered two more new courses namely Post Graduate Diploma in Early Intervention and M.Phil (Clinical Psychology) during the year 2013-14
- General Council meeting of NIEPMD was held on 5th December 2013 at New Delhi under the Chairpersonship of Smt. Stuti Kacker, Secretary to Govt. of India, MSJ&E, Department of Disability Affairs.

Chapter 1

Introduction

Government of India has initiated several significant endeavors for persons with disabilities through Department of Disability Affairs under Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment. Seven National Institutes has been established for different disabilities in different parts of the Country and their regional and composite centres. The prime objective of these National Institutes is to ensure proper rehabilitation of persons with Disabilities and also to include them into mainstream of the society in order to make them a productive member of the society. This initiative has direct linkage to the implementation of various acts, policies and legislations at National and International level.

As known National Policy for Persons with Disabilities, 2006 and the enactment of United Nation Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD, 2007) in our country has created a new dimension in the development process of rehabilitation for persons with disabilities in India. National Policy for persons with disabilities changed the scenario from charity or welfare based model to the right based model of service delivery in the field of disability & rehabilitation. UNCRPD also recognized the inherent dignity and recognized the need to promote & protect the human rights of all persons with disabilities, including those who require more intensive support such as persons with multiple disabilities. Such actions earmarked path for persons with disabilities to lead a better quality of life if equal opportunity and effective access to rehabilitation measures has been provided to them. Enactment of three Acts related to empowerment of persons with disabilities viz. Rehabilitation Council of India Act-1992, The Persons with Disabilities Act (Equal opportunities, protection of rights & full participation)- 1995 & National Trust Act-1995 (for persons with Mental Retardation, Multiple Disabilities, Cerebral Palsy and Autism) were considered as important milestones to guarantee the rights of persons with disabilities and their families. Establishment of National Institutes to meet the needs of different disabilities across the country were venerated steps of the Ministry. As per the disabilities mentioned in the PwD Act, 1995 & National Trust Act, 1999 were catered through the six National Institutes namely NIVH, NIMH, NIHH, NIOH, PDUIPH & NIRTAR, except the services for persons with multiple disabilities. Hence, in 2005 Ministry came forward to establish one National Institute for persons



with multiple disabilities to empower them and thus National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities came into existence in southern part of the Country, Chennai. Since the inception in 2005 the services for Persons with Disabilities for single as well as Multiple disabilities at NIEPMD has been given on an out-patient basis through a multi disciplinary team model, besides the cottage – services and extension services.

Census of India, 2011 enumerated data on eight types of disabilities including first time entry of multiple disabilities. This data gave a picture of prevalence of multiple disabilities in the Country and guide path to NIEPMD in planning various services of rehabilitation for this group of society. Census data, 2011 on disability shows that there are 2.68 crores persons are with disabilities in India, which constitute 2.21% of the total population, out of which 21.16 lakhs belongs to the category of multiple disabilities. To ensure all human rights to disabled persons specially to those who need more intensive support i.e. persons with multiple disabilities, NIEPMD worked extensively in the year 2013, 2014 7548 clients were registered at NIEPMD and its extension centre. About 2140 were Persons with Multiple Disabilities and 5408 were persons with various types of single disability were registered and 42,086 clients were received various rehabilitation services (follow up) at NIEPMD and its extension centre. Among those clients 27,185 were persons with Multiple Disabilities and 14901 were Single Disabilities. Since NIEPMD follows the policy of zero percent rejection in registering the persons with disabilities, all kinds of persons with disabilities are registered. Through Prime Minister National Council skill development program 956 trainers across the country got benefited, by undertaking training in various trades.

NIEPMD is a national resource centre for persons with multiple disabilities, which focus more on development of curriculum, on long term and short term courses to develop manpower for the empowerment of persons with multiple disabilities. During the academic year 2013-14 one M. Phil., two PG Diploma, one Degree and three Diploma courses were offered at NIEPMD. The duration of all the Diploma courses in Special Education offered at NIEPMD has been enhanced to two years from one year from the Academic year 2011-12. To increase the level of manpower development, NIEPMD has proposed to offer Bachelors in Occupational Therapy from the next academic year 2014-15. During the year 2013-14, the Institute had conducted 254 short term training programs including Training program for professionals in the field of Rehabilitation,



Orientation and awareness programs for parents, teachers and non-disabled students. A total of 9860 participants were benefitted. National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD) organized camps at various places as well as centre for the implementation of ADIP scheme of Government of India in which 2390 aids and appliances were provided to 1922 persons with disabilities during the reporting year 2013-14.

NIEPMD, Sense International(INDIA) and Perkins International, USA, jointly organized a training program "National Training on Communication Assessment of Children with Deafblindness at NIEPMD, Chennai from 1st - 3rd August 2013. Shri.Sivasankaran, IAS, Secretary, Dept. of Welfare of the Differently Abled, Govt. of Tamil Nadu was the Chief Guest. About 35 senior professionals and mentors in Deafblindness participated the training. 'PARIVAAR' organized Chennai Round Table Conference 2013 on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities at NIEPMD during 7th – 8th August 2013. Hon'ble Minister Smt. P. Valarmathi, Dept. of Social Welfare and Nutritious Meal program, Govt. of Tamil Nadu was the Chief Guest. During the program Hon'ble Minister visited all the service activities of NIEPMD.

During this year NIEPMD and Department of Disability Affairs, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India, jointly have successfully organized a conference exclusively for Northern Eastern states. North East Conference on Rehabilitation of Persons with Multiple Disabilities was held at Guwahati, Assam from 27th – 28th September 2013. Then Hon'ble Minister of State PorikaBalram Naik, MSJ&E, Gol, was the Chief Guest and Shri. Akon Bora, Minister of Jails & Social Welfare, Govt. of Assam was the Guest of Honour. NIEPMD and Indian School Psychology Association (InSPA) jointly organized the "3rdInSPA National Conference on School Psychology Services to Persons with Multiple Disabilities" at NIEPMD during 22 – 24th November 2013. Shri.P.Rajavelu, Hon'ble Minister for Tourism and Social Welfare, Puducherry, was the Chief Guest and inaugurated the conference on 22nd November 2013. NIEPMD organized "National Conference on Rehabilitation of Persons with Multiple Disabilities: Best Practices and Models of Rehabilitation - National & International Perspective at Siri Fort, New Delhi from 27 - 28th November 2013. Ms. StutiKacker, Secretary to Govt. of India, DDA, MSJ&E was the Chief Guest and inaugurated the conference on 27th November 2013 at 10 am. Shri. Awanish K. Awasthi, Joint Secretary to GOI, DDA, MSJ&E was the Guest of Honour. About 230 participants participated in the conference.



Meeting of the Consultative Committee of Parliament on "Role of National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities" was held on 18th December 2013 at Committee Room "C" Parliament House Annexe, New Delhi under the Chairpersonship of then Hon'ble Minister KumariSelja, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India. The then Hon'ble Ministers of State Shri.PorikaBalram Naik, Shri. Manikrao Hodlya Gavit, Members of Lok Sabha, Members of Rajya Sabha, Smt. StutiKacker, Secretary to Govt. of India, DDA, MSJ&E, and Shri. Awanish K. Awasthi, Joint Secretary to Govt. of India, DDA, MSJ&E, were present on the occasion.

As part of the Institutional attachment program for IAS trainee officer, 18 IAS officers from Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie, Dehradun underwent institutional attachment tour at NIEPMD during 17 – 19th January 2014. NIEPMD organized National Level Sports meet for Diploma in Special Education Trainees from 14th – 16th February 2014 at NIEPMD & Tamil Nadu Physical Education & Sports University, Chennai. Dr. J.A. Benjamin, General Secretary, SIVUS India & Dr. M.S. Nagarajan, Senior Manager, Special Olympics, Asia pacific Region was the Chief Guest on the occasion.

Considering higher prevalence rate of multiple disabilities due to Japanese Encephalitis & Acute Encephalitis Syndrome, NIEPMD initiated activities through Composite Regional Centre for persons with disabilities at Gorakhpur, U.P. The Centre was inaugurated on 18th February, 2014 by Shri. J.P. Gupta I.A.S., Commissioner, Gorakhpur Division.

The services at NIEPMD are from "**Womb to Tomb**". The youngest child who had attended our Early Intervention Unit was 9 days old and the oldest client that came was 96 year old amputee. Being an institute for Multiple Disabilities, clients with many neurologically deteriorating conditions, multiple challenges, rare syndrome have made each faculty to think in holistic manner and provide appropriate rehabilitation strategies. Those deceased during services, the Director & staff pay homage and provide counseling regarding grief & bereavement too- truly a "Womb to Tomb" service.



Chapter 2

Organizational Structure

National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities is an Autonomous body under the Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment(MSJ&E), Govt. of India registered under The Tamil Nadu Society Registration Act 1975(Tamil Nadu Act 27 of 1975) bearing Registration No: 59/2006 dated 23rd October 2006.

The Secretary, MSJ&E, is the President of General Council (GC) and Joint Secretary (Disability Division) is the Chairperson of the Executive Council (EC). The Director, NIEPMD carries out the activities of the Institute under the guidance of the GC and EC.

2.1 The General Council: This Council guides and monitors the overall management of the Institute. During the Reporting period the Council met on **5**th **December 2013** at Conference Hall, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Shastri Bhawan, New Delhi. 
2.3 Academic Committee:

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

During the academic year 2013-14, admission notification for the M.Phil (Clinical Psychology), PGDDT, PGDE, B.Ed-Spl. Edn(MD) and Diploma courses, was published in National Dailies viz., The Hindu & Dina Thanthi & Employment News as well as uploaded in the NIEPMD website. For admission to Diploma courses RCI, New Delhi introduced online entrance examination and the response from

the students was not good only three candidates were admitted. RCI, New Delhi permitted to follow the old procedure to admit the students for Diploma courses for the year 2013 -14. Hence, admission notification was published again on 25.08.2014 & 08.09.2103. The applications received were scrutinized and the eligible students were called for interview on 14.08.2014 for B.Ed-Spl. Edn(MD) and PG Diploma courses for Diploma courses on 05.09.2013. Provisionally selected

students were instructed to take admission on or before 19th August 2013.

For M.Phil (Clinical Psychology), the applications received were scrutinized and the eligible students were called for written test / interview on 17.10.2013. Out of eleven students appeared for written test, eight (08) candidates were shortlisted for interview. The committee recommended four (04) candidates for admission to M.Phil (Clinical Psychology) for the academic

year 2013 -15. The provisionally selected students were instructed to take admission on or before 10th October 2013

RESERVATION OF SEATS:

3.2 Short Term Training Programs:

This Institute regularly conducting Short Term Training Programs includes Continuing Rehabilitation Programs (CRE), Workshops, Conferences, Orientation & Sensitization programs. The training programs are designed to orient the Officials in Government and Non-Governmental organizations and to update the knowledge of the Rehabilitation and allied professionals throughout the country

During the year 2013-14, the Institute had conducted 254 programs including Training program for professionals in the field of Rehabilitation, Orientation and awareness programs for parents, teachers and students (normal students). A total of 9860 participants were benefitted.




Fig 1: Trainees trained in Short Term courses

Chapter 4

Services

Services:

Providing suitable rehabilitation services to both the persons with Multiple Disabilities and single disabilities including the clients coming with impairment is one of the primary functions of NIEPMD. This rehabilitation services are coordinated by the Department of Social Work, through

Service and program section.

The service & program section is having two wings called registration and case history taking unit. The registration unit makes registering the clients and providing necessary information about the institute to the clients and visitors. The registration unit also receives the calls from outside and giving appointments and other information through phone to the general public.

The case history taking unit is managed by the Professional Social worker where the Social worker will take the detailed first hand information about the client & their family, covering Antenatal care, Postnatal care, family history, developmental history, immunization covered, school history

and family dynamics. This unit also collects the registration charges and service charges as per the NIEPMD fee structure.

Once the procedure of case history taking process is over then the client will be guided to other departments for specific assessment and intervention. Apart from regular services, NIEPMD also conducts special clinics viz.,

Neurological, Psychiatric and Dental care on every month. The Institute also supplies medicines to persons with disabilities for Neurological and Psychiatric conditions.

In the year 2013-14, 7548 clients were registered at NIEPMD and its extension centre. About 2140 were Persons with Multiple Disabilities and 5408 were persons with various types of single disability were registered and 42086 clients were received various rehabilitation services (follow up) at NIEPMD and its extension centre. Among those clients 27185 were persons with Multiple Disabilities and 14901 were Single Disabilities. Since NIEPMD follows the policy of zero percent rejection in registering the persons with disabilities, all kinds of persons with disabilities are registered.




Fig2: New Cases registered




Fig3: Follow up session

The Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation has diagnosed and provided services to Persons with Multiple Disabilities as well as Persons with Single Disabilities. The

single disability services were carried out as out-patients visiting the Institute for specific treatment in the various departments. The Persons with Multiple Disabilities are referred to the different Units under this department, Early Intervention, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Prosthetic & Orthotic Material Development Unit and Sensory Integration. Following the medical examination the

clients are referred for specialized services and sometimes drugs were prescribed to the clients. The clients with rare diseases are referred for further detailed tests. These tests include Cardiac test, like Echo, ECG, X-ray chest, scans like, MRI, abdominal scan and blood test for biochemical abnormalities. When a familial condition is suspected patients are sent for genetic counseling and genetic analysis. Special referrals are given to Eye hospital like Sankara Nethralaya and heart conditions to Apollo Hospitals and General conditions to Chettinad Hospitals. The Government hospital for children at Chennai and for adults also treating NIEPMD clients for various conditions. There is increase in the number of clients with rare diseases like in born errors of metabolism, syndromes like West Syndrome, Lysosomal storage disorders, Lipid Dystrophy, Gazell A type of Epiphysial disorder, Patau Syndrome were reported

Besides medical services therapeutic services are also provided through the department to make the clients mobile and independent through exercises, electro and sensory integration therapies and by providing various aids and appliances including artificial limbs. The main objective of the department is to make "life in the years" of the clients and the focus is on training the parents in doing exercises and activities to help their child with disability. This unit also organizes periodical interventions and holds Psychiatry, Neurology, Ophthalmology & Dental Clinics for the clients with Multiple Disabilities. The details of clients benefitted during the year 2013-14 are as follows.

Early Intervention Unit:

The early intervention services are provided for children at risk / developmental delay from birth to three years. The children are assessed for different developmental aspects such as

motor, language, cognitive, self-help, social and emotional skills. Play way method is imparted to stimulate the developmental functioning of the children. A home based program is also prepared and explained to parents to follow the same. The registered clients with multiple disabilities brought to the centre by their mother. Rare causes for Multiple Disabilities have been registered.

There is a rise in inborn errors of metabolism

as a cause for disabilities. Innovative methods like magnetic collar and magnetic grasper have been developed. The magnetic collar helps to improve head steadiness and magnetic grasper is used to develop grasp. The details of clients for the year 2013 -14 as follows.

Physiotherapy Unit:

Physiotherapy means a branch of modern medical science where physical agents like heat, cold, light, water, electricity and exercises including mobilization and manipulation, are used as treatment modalities, which have a diagnostic, prognostic, preventive and rehabilitative dimension in treatment of disease, disorder or disability. Physiotherapy has been applying for the persons with movement difficulties such as sitting, standing, walking etc.

As a preventive measure we are prescribing the suitable aids and appliances according to the need of persons with movement difficulties. And also works for maintain the movement abilities or condition to prevent further deterioration.

Neurodevelopmental Therapy approach was considered a method to normalize postural tone, inhibit abnormal reflexes, and improve the quality and control of movements for the children

with Cerebral Palsy and Developmental delay. Facilitation and inhibition techniques are taught as methods of manual intervention to assist motor control.

Pulmonary Rehabilitation helps in loosening secretion and increasing the Lung Volume. Gait training works in improving the standing stability, walking ability and locomotion.

The appropriate positioning was taught for the parents to avoid adapting abnormal posture and reflex. The regular follow up has been made for the clients to review the goals and for further management. The home program advice had been given for the parents to execute the plan at home which helps in achieving the goal such as maintaining body alignment at home in sitting or reading or carrying etc.

Occupational Therapy Unit:

Occupational Therapy is one of an essential unit in the rehabilitation setup to provide maximum functional ability and enhance clients' independency in activities of daily living by doing purposeful and productive activities.

The main focus of Occupational Therapy aims at improving the functional abilities of the client, including both gross motor and fine motor skills, achieving developmental milestones, enhancing the cognitive-perceptual abilities and activities of daily living skills.

Clients attending occupational therapy services are subjected to initial evaluation, followed by goal setting and treatment implementation. Regular monitoring of progress of the clients is observed and documented.

Clients with Cerebral palsy, Mental Retardation, Autism Spectrum Disorder, Attention deficit hyperactive disorder, Learning Disability, Orthopedic & Neurological Disorders, Geriatric

Conditions, Psychiatric conditions and other developmental disabilities are benefited by Occupational therapy unit service in NIEPMD.

Occupational therapy unit had submitted their proposal to establish their services in Psychiatry, Hand Splinting, Activities of Daily Living unit, Recreational Activity unit In the near future, after established these new units, the numbers of beneficiaries will be peaked up to 1200 clients per month.

In addition, our professionals participated in Identification and materials distributions camps under ADIP scheme. Prescription of Splints & adaptive devices for clients with neurological impairment is also done. Fitting of the splints, the wearing schedule & the maintenance of splints are explained to them. Realistic goals of individual clients are met through Occupational Therapy services.

Prosthetic & Orthotic Unit:

The unit serves the persons with disabilities by way of providing rehabilitation aids and appliances to replace the lost limb, support, correct and prevent the deformity in weak limbs leading to disabilities. This unit also provides services to the persons with disabilities in terms of assessment, measurement, fabrication, fitment and training of various types of orthotic, prosthetic, splint, adaptive devices and seating devices as per their needs and requirement to perform and make accessible to environment and community.

Department of Clinical Psychology:

The Department of Clinical Psychology functions with the target of developing human resources in the field of disability; providing rehabilitation services and taking up research projects pertaining to the field. As part of the same, M. Phil Clinical Psychology, a two year speciality program was started during this academic year with an intake of four students per year. Apart from that, the department also gets involved in handling theory and practical classes for Diploma, Post-Graduate Diploma and B. Ed., courses. Various short-term training programs were also conducted to enhance the knowledge of rehabilitation professionals.

Thedepartment executes the rehabilitation services by performing psychological assessments and providing interventions based on psychological principles. Standardized assessment tools are used to assess the development / intellectual functioning of the individuals, which helps in planning the education and the rapeutic programs of them. Apart from that, other Cognitive functioning, Specific Learning Disability assessment, Personality tests, Neuropsychological and

Psycho-diagnostic assessments were done to assess the various psychological profiles of the individuals.

As part of the interventions, Behaviour Management is provided for those individuals to reduce maladaptive behaviour and to improve adaptive behaviour. Further, Cognitive Enhancement techniques are provided to improve the cognitive functioning of the persons with disabilities. The department ensures the involvement of family members during the therapeutic sessions, which enables them to observe, learn and implement

the same techniques at home. Cognitive rehabilitation and psychotherapy are also provided for various behavioural and emotional problems of persons with multiple disabilities and to the family members. The Department also runs Psychiatric Clinic bi-monthly to ensure the medical requirements of persons with psychiatric co-morbidity. A multi-dimensional approach is been practised to provide holistic interventions to improve the mental health and the quality of life of persons with disabilities

The Department of Special Education is playing a very vital role in rehabilitating the clients with multiple disabilities. It holds the responsibility of developing appropriate service delivery model for persons with multiple disabilities. Another important role of the Department is to develop human resource

in the field of special education who will work with the children with multiple disabilities. The Department also carried out the program of research and development such as development of functional assessment check list for programming of children with multiple disabilities, viz. autism spectrum disorder, cerebral palsy and deaf blind with additional disabilities. Preparation of teaching learning materials and adaptive devices to facilitate the functions of persons with multiple disabilities is part of the program of the department. Facilitation of inclusive education and to develop the training modules for in-service teachers and other professionals to carry out the task of inclusive education is also one of the programs of department.

Model school for persons with multiple disabilities is being run successfully to provide the various educational and other rehabilitation services in the school atmosphere. The clients registered in the Model School belong to the group having children with multiple disabilities of various combinations. The program of each child carried out in the school is well informed to the parents through conducting regular parent teacher meeting and during daily interaction with them as it is mandatory that parents/guardians should accompany the clients when they come to Model School.

The model school is also working as place to provide practical exposure to trainee teachers in the field of disabilities areas. Trainee teachers of HRD programs conduct various practical assignments and conduct research in the area of multiple disabilities in different Units of the Model School as a part of their curriculum. The teacher-student ratio has maintained at 1:8 with mild to moderate challengeable group and 1:4 with severe and profound challengeable group and this atmosphere requires more special attention and facilities. About 105 children with enrolled in the model school during the year 2013-14.

Early Childhood Special Education Unit:

Early Childhood Special Education unit of Model School is focusing on the children belong to the age of 3 to 6 years. In ECSE unit all possible combinations of children with multiple disabilities are being taken care. Preschool education program is being imparted in the Unit through which professionals prepare the

child for school (School readiness program). After successful completion of this program, the unit recommends the child to study in regular school i.e. inclusive education setup.

Deafblind with additional disabilities Unit:

The Deafblind Unit is unique as each person with Deafblindness is different from the other as the degree of visual and hearing impairment varies and because of associated problem that interferes with the development. The major areas that are given importance are communication, information, functional academics, transition and vocational activities. Special strategies such as coactive signing, tangible symbols

are used to develop communication. Tactile mode along with residual sensory abilities helps to explore and learn from the classroom activities. Real life experiences, real objects are used to develop concepts in children in early education level. The DB students are also explored to specially designed tactile garden. There were 17 clients are enrolled in the Unit during 2013-14.

Autism with additional disabilities Unit:

ASD Unit has admitted 35 Children having autism with additional disabilities. The Unit is further divided into three sections viz. primary, secondary, &transition. Age range assign to each section is 6-10 years for primary, 10-14 years secondary & 14-18 years for transition. In each section, there are 8 to 10 Children are studying. During the admission, the children

were assessed with Childhood Autism Scale Rating (CARS), Psycho Educated Profile (PEP's) and Functional Assessment Checklist for Programming (FACP) tools for identifying their current level functions and implementing the Individualized Educational Program.

In this unit the children were trained to use communication both verbal and non-verbal mode using PECS method. Based on the assessment, these children provided structured classroom teaching using appropriate teaching learning materials (TLM) and visual strategies for their better learning.

Total

There are 14 children were admitted in the Unit, all the children were diagnosed with cerebral palsy with additional disabilities like mental retardation with seizure and low vision and thus termed as severe and profound multiple disabled children. These children were assessed with FACP care group and severe profound program assessment checklist during their admission to see their level of functioning. Based on the assessment, the long and short term goals was planned and implemented. The children were provided individual care during their visit to the Unit and IEP were implemented. Each child was provided communication files to do functional communication and parents were provided home program to care their children in functional academics, communication development, mobility, self-help skills, positioning and lifting. There are different combination of children with multiple disabilities were admitted in the unit.

Department of Speech, Hearing & Communication:

Good communication is central to working with children and parents. It involves listening, questioning, understanding and responding to what is being communicated by children, young people and those who are caring for them. Communication is the interactive exchange of information, ideas, feelings, needs and desires. Language is a formulated code that a group of people use to communicate with one another. Speech is the oral production of language. It is the ability to produce sounds by coordinating and moving specific oral motor structures (e.g., tongue, mouth) at the right time. Communication disorder is an impairment in the ability to receive, send, process and comprehend concepts of verbal, non-verbal and graphic symbols systems.

The department provides service to children and adults having problems related to speech and hearing. The ranges of activities are assessment, diagnosis, intervention, demonstrative home training program, follow-up, audiological evaluation, hearing aid trial & fitment, ear mould impression etc.




Fig: 4 Tree structures of clients availing Communication Therapy

Demonstrative home training program is done with parents focusing on comprehension & expression of speech & language skills. A Client centered approach is practiced, highlighting the abilities of the children, rather than their disabilities. A format called "My Talented Child", is

used for this purpose, where the parents and family members are included as partners in the intervention program.

Apart from clinical a service to children and adults, the department is also involved in training and guiding students from other Institutes of Bachelor of Audiology, Speech and Language Pathology and Master of Rehabilitation Science.



The department of audiology performs audiological evaluation of neonates to geriatric population using state of art equipments like Pediatric Screening Audiometry, Screening OAE, Screening ABR, Pure Tone Audiometry and Impedance Audiometry. After an audiological

evaluation, hearing aid trial and fitment is done along with distribution of appropriate hearing aids and appliances. Finally the children were given intervention in an individual and group auditory and speech training. The Department is also involved in conducting CRE programs to rehabilitation professionals.

Department of Social Work:

The Department of Social Work is a viaduct between the various departments of the Institute and the Clients coming for various services. All the clients who are registered for various services are observed thoroughly by the department. It also provides counseling and guidance to the clients to visit various departments in order to get the necessary services. The department also refers the clients to the appropriate other departments of NIEPMD

and various organizations outside NIEPMD for providing holistic care and services to the clients.

This department also enlightens the parent on various schemes and programs for the family members having persons with disabilities and also educates the parents on the procedure to avail the schemes and programs for the empowerment of the family. The issues related with

disability, which creates problem in the family addressed by the parents are also been suitably intervene by the Social worker by applying Social work methods to help them to cope-up with the problems more successfully. The department also provides comprehensive diagnosis report about the family member having disability and means to handle the problem in an effective manner.

Mobile Services:

The department of Social work is also conducting mobile services on regular basis to identify the persons with disabilities residing within 50 kms radius of NIEPMD. Two qualified rehabilitation staffs were engaged to carry out the mobile services. The objectives of the mobile services are as follows,

- 1. Identify the clients with disabilities at the earliest possible.
- 2. To explain the parents/family members about the disability.
- 3. Educate the parents in management of the persons with disabilities at the home and community level.
- 4. Link the clients with NIEPMD and nearest service providers for availing suitable services.
- 5. Orient the family members about the disability Identity card and various schemes and programs available for persons with disabilities.
- 6. Provides suitable aids and appliances for the persons with disabilities at the community level




Fig 5: Graphical representation of No. of clients availed various Schemes and Concessions FAMILY COTTAGE SERVICE:

The service of family cottage is provided to the out station clients those who seek NIEPMD for services. This facility is provided on the appointment basis and it is availed by the clients for a period of 7 to 10 days. This provision gives the clients and their family to reside at NIEPMD campus for a short-term period, helping the client to get assessed, counseled and to plan the home-based programs as per the recommendations by the professionals. A total of 40 persons with multiple disabilities along with their family have been provided the family cottage service in the year 2013-14 and the charges are being received from the clients as per the NIEPMD norms.




Fig 6: State wise Details of Beneficiaries under PM's Skill Development Programme-2013-2014




Fig 7: Disability wise Details of Beneficiaries under PM's Skill Development Programme-2013-2014



SUCCESS STORY-1



Master T. Dharun is one year 2 months old, active and co-operative boy. He is diagnosed as a Developmental delay borderline intellectual. He came to Occupational therapy department for a detailed evaluation to find out the problems relevant to occupational therapy. Therapy interventions like NDT, roods approach, biomechanical approach, and various O.T handling techniques were used.

Through the interventions he achieved the following skills like Neck, head control and trunk control skills are improved satisfactorily. He able to maintain sitting with self support for period of more than 10 mins. He achieved near age appropriate Hand function skills like Hand to mouth skills, Oro-motor skills like chewing, biting, swallowing functions are improved and drooling problems were suppressed through the above mentioned functional ability.

His progresses in play skills areas are showing satisfactory changes (near age appropriate). Eg. Self exposure to playing object, reaching, grasping and manipulating sound making toys. His Visual tracking towards the objects were improved.

Proper home program was given to the parents in lifting & carrying, handling techniques and feeding positions and techniques.



The trainees of the Post Graduate Diploma in Early Intervention and their fullest potentials focused on Early development



It is an everlasting memory in the minds of parents and master trainers and their wards. The master trainers gave their incessant efforts on the young babies under 3 years of age. These trainees concentrated on developing cognitive skills, motor skills, language development and socialization. For self help skills like feeding, the trainees learnt the tricks from the master trainer and did it on themselves. Later they practised feeding the children without tears. The parents were also empowered by the 5 PGDEI trainees to position the child, to feed the child and to develop fine motor skills. Sensory development was focused so well by the trainees on the clients. Sensory motor development, Sensory motor activities helped to develop cognisant. The faces of the babies brightened up and this produced the smile the face of the mothers too.



Baby Sahana, 6 year old Female child affected with Cerebral Palsy(Spastic diplegia) came to NIEPMD for Physiotherapy unit for assessment. She has the ability of crawling, Kneeling for few seconds. She is not able to bear full weight on bilateral upper extremities, during Quadriped position, unable to maintain trunk stability in sitting while reaching out and also pelvic instability present.

Intervention strategies:

NDT approach has been followed in PT unit.

Positioning was done and facilitated the muscles by encouraging the child to be more of

active in doing exercise.

 Stretching joint approximation, soft tissue, manipulation was done in preparatory face.

- Posture correction, Gait training, Balance training.
- Pain management and electrotherapy modalities.

IMPROVEMENTS:

- She has been treated since 2012 may, twice in a week for a session with 45 minutes.
- Engaged in positioning, kneeling, halfkneeling, worked on trunk stability, rising from half-kneeling, standing and gait training has been followed.
- The present state is that the child is able to do kneeling, kneel-walking, coming to standing from high-sitting with mild support and able to walk with rollator's support.





Miss D. Rathna aged 14 years, diagnosed as Multiple Disabilities. She studied secondary level in Cerebral Palsy Unit. Her current level of performance was difficulty in doing her self-help skills, performing academic skills, motor activity, language and communication, play and recreational activities. She has difficulty in drinking and eating, problem in ADL activities. She did not speak clearly. She has poor fine motor skills and fair eye hand coordination skills. She can walk independently.

After the intervention, she shows lot of interest in study. She does two digit additions with carry over. She shows the picture whenever asked– Fruits, Vegetables Alphabets, Tamil letters. She identifies staff names in NIEPMD. She identifies words in English and Tamil.

She writes her name, DOB, Gender address and phone number and she receives the maintenance grant from postman by signing her name. **She passed 8**th **standard in normal school education**. In Personal Skills she aware of menstrual Hygiene. She helps her mother in domestic activity. She drinks independently.

Her drooling is controlled. In Occupational skills, she makes coffee and juice with adult supervision. She was interested in art and craft work. She is very nice girl. She cooperates in her class friends. She has easily mingled with other persons. She has lot of interested in studies, doing classroom activities & cultural activities.

Master. V.Naresh Choppra aged 7 years hailing from lower socio- economic status was brought with complaints of delayed development in motor, speech and cognitive, the child was born to non-consanguineous union, currently lives with his parents. The child reported to NIEPMD on 25-07-12 further child has been assessed by the multidisciplinary team including Medical, Psychology, PT, OT, Speech Therapy and Special Education. The assessment team was found he has Autism Spectrum Disorder with Mild Developmental delay and he was referred to Special Education Department.



In Special Education, he was referred to ECSE unit for preparation of school readiness (Inclusive Education) for period of one year (July2012-April2013). The child in ECSE unit the major challenges faced by parents is ADL, concept building, social and language skills. He was dependent for most of his activity by mother. Hence the major focus of training in the major problem areas and the goals are selected

and intervention was given. During in ECSE class he was participated and won prizes in Local, state and National Level games namely.

- 7thAscendas Excellence Award 2013 for excellence in the field of "SPORTS" by Tamil Nadu Differently Abled Federation Charitable Trust on 14th November 2013.
- 1st prize in 25meters Running 5-8years in13th State level Sports Meet for the Differently Abled Persons on 22nd February 2014.
- Participated in 7th National Games for the Disabled (Affiliated to Paralympics
 Committee of India) for Multiple Disabilities February 2013 and he won prizes
 under Multiple Disabilities categories that are second place in 100 meters
 Running, First place in 50 meters Running, Third Place in Tennis Ball Throw.



 Participated in Vegam 2013- Athletic Meet for the Differently Abled. He won First place in the event of Target Bowling, Third place in 25 meters running on February 2013

He succeeded through various teaching strategies/ techniques and showed significant improvement in each areas. He has improvement in writing skills, reading skills, communication skills and started speaking simple sentences, playing with other children cooperatively, able to counting object up to 10, independent in ADL Skills. He has been referred to regular school (Inclusive Education). He got admission and studying in IRT School, Balaya Nedunkuppam, Kuvathur, Kalpakkam for LKG for the academic year of 2013-14. His performance was good and getting good marks in study. At the same time he has come for school support services for weekly twice for improving further skills.

Successes story - 6

Making Rights Real for Adults Girl with special needs.

Ms. A. Punitha, 24 years, being the youngest child of the family, she was supported by all the family member especially her two elder sister and parents. As soon as she was identified with special needs, She underwent training at different place in her walks of life. But her hidden talents were exhibited after she approached to NIEPMD.





She underwent School education up to 7th class near to her house. She was registered with NIEPMD in the year 1/1/2012. After initial Multidisciplinary assessment, she was referred to Department of Adult Independent Living. A detailed assessment was done by the experts. Her



current level of Performance in Personal Hygiene, Communication skills, Academic Skills, Work behavior skills, House hold activities, Sex education, Self Advocacy, Safety skill and referred to newly established Domestic Skill unit for further training.

Within a period of 2 years, she reached the path of success, by systematic training with the support of vocational instructors. More emphasis of training was given in personal hygiene skills where there is immediate acceptance by family & community members. By training her presentation skills – she gained glory to the department by taking point in the preparation of snacks. As per the saying "See the Abilities- not the Disabilities" Ms.Punitha proved to many of the visitors, Professionals, and other members of the community. So for an amount of sale for Rs 26,305/- was generated by her team, with the support of vocational instructor Mrs.C.Mala.

Similarly by gaining confidence among her departmental colleagues, she engaged herself as an trainer to take care of fellow adult girls. She was made as a role model, among her groups, in day to day activities.

Some of the noteworthy skills seen during the course of training need for adult girl were seen in Ms.A.Punitha, as par with Adult Independent Living skills.

- Personal Hygiene skills:-Maintain Hygiene for selling snacks, Neatness in dressing & grooming)
- Work Behavior skills:-Independent cooking, maintain kitchen, Vessels, Cloth Folding
- Sex Education skills:- Communicate with good manners with Adult boys and new members)
- Safety skills: Travel Independently, Taking care of herself
- Academic skills:- Purchase independently, Calculating changes, Collection of Items

Thus Ms. Punitha received her level of achievement with the support of family members, professionals, community, where in the "Goal no 6 (Ensured gender Equality and women Empowerment) of INCHEON STRATEGY 2012" achieved directly.

Chapter 5

Scheme of Assistance to Disabled Persons for Purchase / fitting of Aids and Appliances (ADIP) Services

The Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India has selected this institute as one of the implementing agencies for distribution of assistive devices to disabled persons. The aids and appliances supplied under the scheme shall confirm to Bureau of Indian Standard (BIS) specifications to the extent possible. The Assessment and Distribution camps were organized as per the need and requirement of the community. The National Institute for Empowerment of Persons with Multiple Disabilities (NIEPMD) organized camps at various places as well as centre for the implementation of ADIP scheme of Government of India in which 2390 aids and appliances were provided to 1922 persons with disabilities during the reporting year 2013-14. The details are as follows

Chapter 6

Research & Development

Research is a scientific and systematic search for pertinent information on a specific topic. It includes a careful investigation or inquiry especially through search for new facts in any branch of knowledge. Research is an academic activity. It consists of defining and redefining problems, formulating hypotheses or suggested solutions, collecting, organizing and evaluating data and reaching conclusion. In the field of rehabilitation it is always evidence based research that is carried out. Research and Development is one of the objectives of NIEPMD

The Academic committee has been formed to provide guidance for the Research projects.

The details of the research projects thus undertaken are as follows:-

1. Genetic Profiling of Clients with Multiple Disabilities - Genetics of Consanguinity

Consanguinity has been associated with increased risk in progeny with co-morbidities or disabilities. The inheritance of defective autosomal recessive genes in the progeny from parents is in the order of 25% in each pregnancy. The estimated cost of Project is Rs.13,42,000. The expenditure incurred for the project is Rs. 12,02,800

Aim

Through this study of consanguineous parents and their affected multiply disabled children, we hope to show how consanguineous parents pass their carrier (Autosomal recessive) defective gene, to their children, resulting in a dominant affected Disorder.

Methodology

The study design employed SNP array to look for quantitative genomic imbalance in the form of deletions or duplications or in the form of Loss of Hetrozygosity (LOH). Parents and normal sibling were also tested and acted as controls. Deletions and duplication were seen in the patients that were also seen in their parents and normal sibling. LOH spanning several base pairs on a number of chromosomes were noticed in all cases. Those LOH that did not overlap with controls were potential regions with likely target candidate genes.



Outcome

In 5 of the 10 patients seen, autosomal recessive genes of these LOH regions matched to that of the disorder in the patient. We notice normal siblings did not inherit the defective gene and had lesser content of LOH regions. Policy makers must realize the need for consideration of legislation against consanguineous unions or at least mandate the screening of couples drawn into consanguineous unions.




Fig.8: . LOH (Loss of Hetrozygosity) on autosomal chromosomes. Each block represent LCHS (Long Continuous Homozygous Stretches) on chromosome, accordingly.

Current Status: Completed

2. Existing service provisions for Persons with Multiple Disabilities in India- A database compilation

Persons with Multiple disabilities do have a combination of various disabilities that may include: Physical mobility, mental retardation, visual, hearing and other associated disabilities. Thus there is a need to have a data bank pertaining to the existing services and service models available in the whole country.

Duration of the project is 3 years and the estimated cost of the project is Rs. 10 lakhs and it is carried out in the department of Social Work. An amount of Rs. 7,74,000/- has been spent for this project till date.

Aim:

To provide a compiled data base of the existing organizations, institutes rendering their services for persons with multiple disabilities in India.

Objectives:

- To compile and categorize the address of the organization/Institutions(s) working for persons with multiple disabilities.
- To compile information pertaining to the services available to persons with multiple disabilities all over India.



- To review information pertaining to the service delivery models available for persons with multiple disabilities.
- To refer the outstation cases to the organization/institute(s) for long term rehabilitation.
- To assess the needs of the NGOs to provide effective services for persons with multiple disabilities.

Expected outcome:

- Data bank of list of organization/institution(s) providing services for persons with multiple disabilities.
- District wise directory of organization/institution(s) will be documented.
- > To compile nationwide data for further research
- To develop unique service delivery model at NIEPMD
- Networking with NGO's working in Tamil Nadu and other states.
- Publication and presentation.

Current status:

- A total of 223 organizations details spreading across the country have been collected
- Verification, Editing and compilation of the collected data are in process.
- Final printing format and designing of the directory is in the progress.

3. Technology Adaptation for Persons with Multiple Disabilities having Multi Sensory Impairment in Skill training set up through Mechatronic devices

The Department of Adult Independent Living, NIEPMD with the Support of Department of Science and Technology (DST) under the scheme Technology Interventions for Disabled and Elderly (TIDE)initiated a project, Titled "Technology Adaptation for Persons with Multiple Disabilities having Multi Sensory Impairment in Skill training set up through Mechatronic devices".

As known Training adult in Skill training setup particularly persons with Multiple Disabilities, needs proper planning and adaptation, to bring out the maximum output. Keeping this in view, the said project is instigated in the Department of Adult Independent Living (AIL). This devices works on the main principle of stimulation to the tactile sense. By this method the individual were conditioned to perform the basic need activities in skill training setup independently. Similarly the same procedure was established for generalization in home environment.

This project is funded by Department of Science & Technology. The duration of the project was for a period of two year with an sanctioned cost of Rs. 3 Lakhs. So for an amount, of Rs. 1,97,658/-(March 2014) was incurred towards the development of adaptive device.

During this year to review the progress of the activities a meeting was held by DST at Hyderabad on 10th January 2014. Where in permission granted for additional budget of 1 Lakhs and extension of time period for another 8 months.

Aim:

- Develop a Mechatronic adaptive devices
- Provide training for basic needs in skill training setup.
- Achieve independency among adults with special needs in Work and Home environment.

Current Status:

- Developed an Adaptive device.
- Effectiveness of adaptive devices established.

Out comes:

- An multi-sensory adaptive devices (vibrator) for use by Instructor in Work and Home environment.
- Manual for Teachers on Parents as adaptive devices.



4. A study on ventilatory pattern, parameters and intervention for the clients with spastic Quadriplegic cerebral palsy.

Patients with quadriplegia have immense changes in ventilatory pattern. There seems to be a similar motor deficit in spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy. Hence, there arises a need to assess their ventilatory parameters and find out whether there is a respiratory compromise. Duration of the project is 3 years and estimated cost of the project is Rs.5 Lakhs, till date an amount Rs.60000/- has been spent for this project.

Aim:

To study the ventilatory pattern, parameters of clients with spastic quadriplegic cerebral palsy, to design an interventional protocol for the same.

Expected outcome:

Depending on the results of the study recommendations will be given in the following areas, to develop a protocol for pulmonary rehabilitation, inclusion of pulmonary rehabilitation in service models, to develop separate pulmonary rehabilitation unit for clients with multiple disabilities.

Current status:

This study was designed to be conducted in 3 phases. The first phase comprises of

- 1. Identifying suitable clients meeting the inclusion criteria.
- 2. Assessing the ventilatory parameters using computerized spirometer.
- 3. Comparing the value of respiratory parameters with normal subjects.
- 4. To find out the area of short fall and device appropriate pulmonary rehabilitation protocol.

Phase 1 Comprising of initial evaluation completed for 40 clients of which 20 is in experimental and 20 is in controlled group. Therapeutic programme for the experimental group was given, 15 clients in this group has completed their training.

The pulmonary training includes,

- 1. Breathing Exercises
- 2. Active exercise to shoulder/shoulder girdle
- 3. Thoracic expansion exercises
- 4. Diaphragmatic strengthening exercises etc.



These exercises were given for a period of 6 weeks with intermittent testing for pulmonary volumes and capacities in the 3rd week. Data analysis for 30 clients (15 experimental and 15 controlled groups) is in process.

5. Study of sleep patterns in children with multiple disabilities and its effect in day to day functioning.

Introduction:

Clients with Multiple Disabilities are often have been problems in getting smooth sleep. The lack of sleep produces inattention, irritation and interferes with learning. Hence, study of sleep patterns and treatment of sleep disorders will help the clients to overcome the above difficulties. Duration of the project is 3 years and an amount Rs.7.5 Lakhs has been allocated for this project.

Aim:

To record the sleep pattern of 50 clients with Multiple Disabilities to analyze the pattern of sleep and give intervention.

Expected outcome:

The clients who are suffering due to inadequate sleep will be made to have a sound sleep and thus reducing the irritability and enhancing the quality of life. This will also help in giving proper treatment for children with multiple disabilities who are suffering from sleep disorders.

Current status:

50 children with multiple disabilities and with problems with sleep have been identified. The proforma regarding assessment of sleep patterns is prepared. A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) has been prepared and signed by Dr Ramakrishnan of the NITRA Sleep Clinic, Chennai. The Clients are being sent to clinic for sleep recording Polysomnography. Sleep pattern are studied from 9.30pm in the night till the child wakes up. 23 children have been sent for sleep analysis. The reports showed problems like non-establishment of Rapid Eye Movement sleep (REM), snoring disturbances, inadequate feeding, seizure disturbances, late onset of sleep. Children were advised accordingly by the Specialist. It was difficult to record the sleep in children with hyperactivity as they pulled out the sensitive electrodes fitted on the head. The clinic has developed adaptations to record the sleep pattern in hyperactive children. Dr. Ramakrishnan, the expert in sleep disorders has advised a device that will prevent apnoeic attacks in children.

Improvements were noticed in the following manner: The attention span has increased, as the children could have prolonged hours of uninterrupted sleep. For all the 23 children assessed – Medication, exercises and modification at home of the sleeping room were provided. It was reported by the parents that there is remarkable improvement in their sleep pattern.

8.1.1. Filling up of identified back log post reserved for SC/ST, OBC and PwDs:

In pursuance to GOI instructions to fill up the identified back log vacancies in respect of SC/ST/OBC and Persons with Disabilities, by conducting Special Recruitment drive, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment vide their letter No:D.O.No:27-02/2008 -Cdn dated 7th May 2010 had instructed NIEPMD to submit their annual direct recruitment plan, to take necessary action to fill up the backlog vacancies and to submit detailed progress report in this regard. However it is submitted that NIEPMD established in the year 2005 and out of 71 posts sanctioned by GOI/EFC, only 32 posts have been created in Phase – I and that the recruitment action for filling up the sanctioned posts were taken up only after March 2007, **there is no back log vacancy** identified to be filled up for SC/ST/PwDs/OBC.

8.1.2. Vigilance cases:

During the period of reporting year **no disciplinary/ vigilance** cases were initiated or pending at NIEPMD.

8.2. Library & Information Service

NIEPMD Library during the year 2013-14 continued to march to its mission of facilitating the creation of new knowledge through the acquisition. It offered various services to the users including reference, membership, circulation, document delivery, resource sharing and information alert service. NIEPMD library caters to the information needs of staff and students of the Institute, Government functionaries, rehabilitation professionals, Persons with Disabilities and their parents. Library collection comprising of books, journals, theses, reports, standards, pamphlets and other reading materials. During the year 7287 visitors visited the Library and 2021 books have been issued to the users. Apart from this Library have Computer Lab for the use of Staff and students. If has been functioning at Social Welfare complex, Vellimadukunnu, since 2011 under the administrative control of NIEPMD. It provides technical and manpower support to CRC. - 3. To undertake designing, fabrication and fitment of aids and appliances.

- 7. To stimulate growth of services by encouraging and supporting voluntary organization, parent groups and self-help groups.
- 8. To establish linkages with existing medical, educational and employment services following the principles of community-based rehabilitation and offer extension services in the rural areas.




Fig 9: No. of Clients registered at CRC-K

Chapter 10

Audit Reports & Annual Accounts

An amount of Rs.11.08 crores were total receipts for the year 2013-14, among those an amount of Rs.0.38 crore was closing balance for the year 2012-13, Rs.9.25 crores had been received as Grants-in-aid from MSJ&E, GOI, and Rs.1.45 crores was collected as Receipts of Tuition fees. Registration fees, Guest House charges and application fees, RIP Maturity and Interest, SB Interest for the year 2013-14. The Recurring and Non-recurring expenses during the year 2013-14 was Rs.8.44 crores and the closing balance as on 31st March 2014 amounting to Rs.2.64 Lakhs will be carried over for the year 2014-15.

In terms of Section 20(1) of C&AG's (DPC) Act, 1971, the CAG, New Delhi had entrusted audit of Annual Accounts of NIEPMD for a period of 5 years from financial year 2006-11 and extended another period of 5 years from 2010-11 to 2015-16 vide O.M.No.1(16)-B(R)/2011, dt.27-07-2011 from Department of Economic affairs , Ministry of Finance to the Director General of Audit (CENTRAL), Chennai. Accordingly, the DAG (C), Chennai is auditing the annual accounts of NIEPMD.

A Effect of revision in accounts

The accounts of the Institute were revised on the basis of audit observations. As a result of revision, Assets and Liabilities were increased by Rs.1.32 crore and the Income (as well as the excess of income over expenditure) was increased by Rs. 0.77 crore.

B Grants in aid

Out of the total grant of Rs.11.76 crore received during the year 2013-14 (NIEPMD Main A/c-Rs.9.26 crore, ADIP Scheme Rs.2.25 Crore CRC, Kozhikode Rs.0.25 crore), Rs.0.43 crore being the grant brought forward from the previous year and Rs.1.46 crore being the internal receipts, the Institute could utilize Rs.10.42 crore leaving a balance of Rs.3.23 crore(NIEPMD Main A/c -Rs.2.64 crore, ADIP Scheme -Rs.0.56 Crore and CRC, Kozhikode-RS.0.03 crore) as at 31st March 2014.

- v Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance sheet, Income & Expenditure Accounts and Receipts & Payment Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.

The books of Accounts of the Institute will be kept on accrual basis (except Pay & allowances of regular staff, Retirement benefits, Receipts of Tuition Fees and purchase of Medicines to Clients. These are accounted as cash basis) to ensure the accomplishment of its essential features namely (a) revenue is recognized as it is earned irrespective of whether cash is received or not; and (b) Expenses are matched against such revenues.
- 2. Since the books of accounts are to be kept on accrual basis (except Pay & allowances of regular staff, Retirement benefits, Receipts of Tuition Fees and purchase of Medicines to Clients. These are accounted as cash basis) the cut-off date will be reckoned as 15th April.
- 3. The Books of Accounts of the Institute are to be kept according to the Double Entry System of Book Keeping.
- 4. For proper identification & maintenance, codification of accounting heads has to be carried out.
- 5. The Statement of Accounts of the Institute are to be prepared in the following format.
 - i) Receipts and Payments Account for the year 2013-14.
 - ii) Income and Expenditure Account for the year 2013-14.
 - iii) Balance Sheet as on 31st March 2014.


